Greetings fellow collectors and SCNA members,

Several significant numismatic events have already occurred this year, the biggest of which was the ANA National Money Show in Charlotte. The SCNA was one of the host clubs along with the NCNA and the Charlotte Coin Club. I was at the show for most of the weekend and was very pleased with what I observed. Attendance was strong and I was happy to see many young people on the bourse floor. The Boy Scouts had a coin collecting merit badge session and the room was packed with over 80 scouts. Exhibits at the show, including a gold panning setup where attendees could pan for real Carolina gold, where top notch. Although the ANA shows typically only have a handful of dealers that deal exclusively in paper money, I was able to add two South Carolina obsolete notes and a colonial note to my collection. Everyone I talked to felt the show was a great success.

A second event I was able to attend was the John J Ford Part 17 auction prior to the Baltimore coin convention. This auction contained the last of the colonial notes from the amazing Ford collection. I was able to add several notes to my collection. Prices were at least as strong as the Ford Part 15 auction held in Atlanta last October. Based on what I have seen and read over the past few months, paper money prices in all specialties have continued to rise this year.

Over the past year I have branched out into collecting South Carolina Trade Tokens. These tokens were typically issued in the early 1900s by employers as payment to their employees and by merchants as small change. I find them fascinating because most of the tokens have the name of the issuing town on them and there is such a large variety of these historical tokens. In general, they are also inexpensive when compared to other areas of numismatics. I encourage you to look into other areas of numismatics once you near completion in your current area of specialization. This keeps things interesting and provides another opportunity for education.

All members are encouraged to submit to the editor items that they find of interest in relation to coins, paper money, tokens, medals or club events pertaining to numismatics.



Exhibitors Recognized in Charlotte

The Bennett family's Young Numismatists from Gaffney, SC, swept the National Coin Week exhibit awards. First place went to Stephen Bennett for his exhibit "The US Mint Presidential Medals: The Miniature Collection." He received a plaque, an engraved Charlotte medal, and a scholarship to the ANA Summer Seminar in Colorado Springs. Second place went to Benjamin Bennett and third place was awarded to Stephen Bennett. Benjamin and Stephen each received plaques recognizing their achievements.

National Coin Week exhibits are intended to be suitable for display in unsecured public locations, such as libraries and schools. Therefore, there is a \$250 limitation on the value of the numismatic materials in exhibits in this competition. In all, 11 exhibits competed for awards.

Numismatists from the Charlotte area and around the country have shown their enthusiasm for exhibiting, mounting 37 competitive exhibits in 123 cases - more than have ever been shown at an ANA National Money Show.

To some, a love token is a perfectly good coin that someone ruined by engraving intitials, a date, a name or a scene into its surface. And yet to others, that engraving is a work of art, making the piece very collectible. As they say, people collect anything and everything, and for a variety of reasons.

Love tokens are regular coins that were taken out of circulation, smoothed down on one or both sides and then inscribed with one or more initials, a name, a date, on object (such as a lovebird), a scene or a meaningful saying. Some collectors say that to be a love token it must be hand engraved, made from a circulating coin, and show engraving that indicated some form of affection (even if only the two individuals understand it). Of course, the definition is not universally held.



Evidence indicates that love tokens were first made in England, and collectors were known to exist as early as the 16th century. Love tokens became especially popular with sailors who would leave a token behind with a waiting sweetheart. When Valentine's Day became popular in the United States, around the time of the Civil War, engraved coins and fancy Valentines became the fashionable way to proclaim one's love. During the war, and peaking in the 1890's, love tokens enjoyed their greatest popularity in America.

Some love tokens were rather primitive pieces, with the inscribing done by a lonesome sailor, a soldier or even a prisoner—using a nail, a pin, a knife or an awl. Jewelers engraved the fanciest pieces, enameling some with as many as five colors of enamel, and sometimes adding some form of colorful stones to the coin's surface. Often love tokens were the work of itinerate craftsmen, working the county and state fairs and other carnivals. Pieces were often pierced so that the lady could wear them. They were made into pins, bracelets, necklaces, earrings, stick pins, buttons, broaches, cuff links and other types of jewelry. Those without holes were often carried as pocket pieces or were simply set aside as a remembrance.



Sometimes the suitor supplied the coin, especially if it was minted in the year that was significant to the couple, such as the year that they met. The engraver could also supply the coin (at an additional cost), giving him the opportunity to smooth one side and engrave a fancy border in advance. This way he could merely add the inscription, reducing the working time at the fair and allowing him to serve more customers.

THE HISTORY OF LOVE TOKENS

There are many love tokens on 1876 coins, presumably because it was our nation's Centennial. There were several engravers to meet the needs of lovers at the World's Fair in New York and at other events that year.

Although we find love tokens on all types and denominations of foreign and U.S. cons, the most popular by far was the Seated Liberty dime. This is primarily because a dime seemed to represent about the proper value for such a gift at the time and silver is a relatively easy metal to inscribe, especially compared to the hardness of copper and nickel.

Pieces were made from denominations ranging from half cents to \$20 gold pieces. In some cases, a \$10 or \$20 gold coin would have initials added that were cut from other gold coins (such as \$5 gold pieces) and overlaid by the silver solder technique. Considering purchasing power of that much money at the time, you would have to say that the individual made a real investment in the love affair!

LOW COUNTRY COIN CLUB

The Low Country Coin Club of the greater Charleston area, held its largest coin show to date. It hosted the annual Winter Coin Show on Feb 2, 3, & 4 at the Exchange Park Fairgrounds in Ladson. The new location included a 7,000 square foot showroom (double the size of the previous venue) with larger aisles giving customers plenty of room to browse. Billy Crawford, a member of the Low Country Coin Club and author of 'A Detailed Analysis of Lincoln Cent Varieties' was provided a guest table throughout the show to display many of his rare varieties and error coins.

Randy Clark, President of the Low Country Coin Club, reported the new location was necessary to support the expanding regional population and number of coin collectors. Fifty-three dealers from Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina, Virginia, Tennessee, Pennsylvania and New York were in attendance. Well over 1000 customers attended the show and nearly all dealers reported average to strong sales and provided positive feedback to the club on the new location and customer turnout.

The new location also provided several firsts for many numismatic dealers, a separate dealer parking area to minimize the probability of dealer thefts and robberies as have occurred following other larger coin shows in recent years. Also, onsite recreational vehicle overnight parking with full hookup was available to dealers. Uniformed and plain-clothed 24 hour security personnel were in attendance throughout the show in addition to other surveillance methods. Customer and dealer security is not taken lightly at this show and is considered to be of paramount importance in ensuring customers and dealers return for future shows.
