SCNA YOUNG NUMISMATIST (YN) PROGRAM

The SCNA had two great programs for Young Numismatists at the 2008 annual convention. First, Mr. Arthur Darr from the Low Country Coin Club had a special table for the YN's. Each YN who visited received a Lincoln Cent of the year of their birth and registered for a free drawing for a Whitman Folder containing 45 Error/Variety Lincoln Cents. In addition, he let each YN view an error/variety under a microscope explaining the details of error/variety. He also showed them an 'altered coin' and pointed out how it was altered, and advised them what to look for and NOT to buy altered coins. He emphasized that most of the altered coins were found in circulation and that they could find errors/varieties of their own.

Ms. Faith Littlejohn of Boiling Springs, SC was the winner of the Whitman (Blue) Folder containing 45 error/variety Lincoln cent. In addition, five free SCNA memberships were given. The winners were Caleb Webster of Ware Shoals, SC, Wilson Fields of Fountain Inn, SC, Rachel D'Hoore of Simpsonville, SC, Luke Hammond of Taylors, SC and Zachary Willoughby of Simpsonville, SC.

On Saturday at 11 am, Mr. Arno Safran presented a program on the Political Portion of Hard Times tokens to a large group of YN's. He told them that many of these tokens have portraits of the principle politicians of the time, Andrew Jackson, Martin Van Buren, Henry Clay, Nicholas Biddle, Daniel Webster, and Thomas Hart Benton ET. Al. He showed examples of Hard Times tokens to the group. After the presentation, prizes were given to all YN's.

The SCNA Young Numismatist Committee would like to thank Mr. Darr and Mr. Safran for their support of the SCNA's YN Program. Mr. Darr for setting-up and manning the table for the YN's during the show and Mr. Safran for giving the program on Political Hard Times tokens. In addition, the YN Committee would like to say a big Thank you to Jim and Helen Barry for their help and support of the YN Program. The SCNA hopes that efforts like these will bring some of these YN's into our great hobby.

A FEW MINUTES WITH B. MAX MEHL By: Michael Seigfried

B. Max Mehl popularized collecting in the early twentieth century with his *The Star Rare Coin Encyclopedia and Premium Catalog: an Elaborate Encyclopedia of the Coins of the World* which he sold for a dollar. It lists his buy prices for United States and foreign coins. Thousands of people began searching their change. Let's browse through the 32nd 1929 edition for insight into collecting a lifetime ago. The hobby we enjoy today owes much to Mehl.

The information presented covers ancient to modern coins with buy prices for United States, England, Germany, France, Egypt, Mexico, and others. There are seventy-five plates and illustrations.

High and low buy prices in six grades: proof, uncirculated, fine, good, fair, and poor are stated for United States coins. Today we do not recognize proof as a grade. He narrowly defined uncirculated: "...coins to be classified as 'uncirculated,' must be as new and bright as when dropped from the coining press; a coin that has been in circulation, no matter whether it shows no marks of wear, cannot be classified as uncirculated." Circulated grades started at fine for which "every feature of the coin must show plainly. It must not show any bad scratches or nicks." The definition of good is the same as fine. Fair coins are worn with clear design features, letters, and date. Poor coins must be very rare to be worth anything over face value.

Prices reveal the market then and were ridiculously low. What commanded premium in the late 1920s is interesting. Many coins which are prized by us were then in circulation. Anyone willing to search had a reasonable chance of finding something Mehl would buy. Very rare older coins could be obtained for only a little because a mass market did not exist. Indeed Mehl helped create the mass market.

Half cents brought 5 to15 cents while 1793 a \$1.00-5.00 and 1796 \$10.00-75.00. For 1840s proofs Mehl paid \$5.00-20.00. A1793 chain large cent brought \$3.50-15.00 and the wreath \$1.50-5.00. A 1799 cent ranged \$2.00-80.00 and an 1804 \$2.00-15.00 all other dates brought 2-5 cents up to 50 cents each depending on grade. Indian cents listed at face value except 1877 which brought 5 to 25 cents. There is no premium for the 1908 S or 1909-S. Lincoln cents were face value except 1909-1912 listed for 2 cents. This is curious. There is no mention of 1909-S V.D.B. or 1909-S or 1914-D as anything special. These mint marked coins gained collector interest after penny broads and folders came out in the 1930s with places for them. Two-cent pieces went for 2-10 cents each and the 1873 for 25 cents to \$2.00.

Mehl paid 5-15 cents for three cent nickels and \$1.00-2.25 for the 1877 proof. The 1878 or 1886 proofs were not special. Five-cent nickels brought face value to 10 cents. The 1877 proof was good for \$1.00-2.50 with no mention of the 1878. 1885 was face value up to 7 cents. There is no mention of the 1912-S, but the 1913

liberty head would get you \$50.00. We now know that no one had a chance of finding one in circulation.

For three cent silver pieces Mehl wanted only proofs and offered 5-25 cents each, but up to \$2.00 for 1864. Half dimes were face value except 1794 at \$1.00-5.00 and 1802 \$20.00-100.00. All dimes were face value to 15 cents except dates before 1803 worth \$1.50-8.00 and the 1804 \$5.00-30.00. Twenty-cent pieces were 25 to 30 cents each except 1876-CC up to \$15.00.

Early quarters generally were 30-75 cents, with the 1823 commanding \$23.00-\$100.00 and 1827 \$30.00-100.00. All other dates were face value up to 30 cents. An Isabella quarter would get you 30-50 cents. The 1916 Standing Liberty quarter is not mentioned.

For half dollars in the 1790s brought \$15.00-75.00. All others were face value to 55 cents except 1838-O \$50.00-100.00 and 1853 No Rays and Arrows \$50.00-100.00. 1879-1890 proof halves were 60 cents with no premium for business strikes. All commemoratives half dollars listed for 65 cents, with the exception of \$2.50 for a Panama-Pacific and \$1.00 for Missouri.

Silver dollars were cheap. For the 1794 Mehl offered \$25-50.00. 1795-1803 commanded \$1.35-3.00. The 1804 would bring \$500-1,250.00. Gobrecht dollars were \$15-50.00. Proof only seated Liberty dollars \$1.10 each, except 1866 \$10.00-60.00 and 1870-S \$50.00-225.00. Carson City issues are not mentioned. Morgan proofs were \$1.25-2.00 each. Interestingly trade dollars are 75 cents each but for 1884 and 1885 he offered \$100.00 and \$160.00 respectively. This is interesting as trade dollars contained more silver than the regular issues, but silver was of no interest.

Gold dollars were \$1.50-3.00 generally. A slight premium for D mints \$5.00-15.00 and \$100 for an 1854-C. Design types were of no interest. Commemorative gold dollars were \$1.15-3.00 apiece.

Quarter eagles ran \$3.50-25.00 each for dates 1796-1832. 1834 is \$25-150.00. There is a small premium for D and C mints \$5-10.00. Mehl offered \$50.-100.00 for an 1858-S, but it is doubtful he was able to purchase any.

Three Dollar gold pieces ran 3.25-6.00 and the 1870-S \$300.00. For the rare proof only issues 1873-1875 Mehl would give \$125-300.00. Four-dollar gold pieces were listed at \$15-150.00.

Half eagle in the 1790s ran \$10-20.00 and the 1798 small eagle \$250-600.00. 1815 is \$500-1,000 and 1822 \$1,500-2,000. These were recognized as true rarities. Countermarked examples were expensive from the 1849-1852 era at \$225-550.00 each. Mehl offered \$10.00 for 1854-S. All others were face value.

Eagles 1795-1838 brought \$11-20. Countermarked eagles 1850-1852 brought \$200.00. For 1875 without a mint, or the proof, would net \$20.00. For doubles eagles Mehl offers face value to \$30. Private gold had substantial premiums in the \$100s indicating popularity. Fifty-dollar gold pieces were \$75-115.

Mehl also wanted encased postage stamps at 75 cents to \$5. Foreign gold brought a near bullion price. Confederate notes were wanted in lots of 100 ranging from 25 cents to \$15.00 for 1861 issues. Continental currency was 5-25 cents each.

The catalog features articles in the U.S Mint, trade dollars, the coins of Rome and England, encased postage and glass coins of China and others. In offering cash for coins and providing information about coins this small book made many people curious. This surely set collecting of coins on the course it took.

GUIDELINES FOR SCNA EDUCATIONAL GRANT AWARD

Applicants for the Young Numismatists Educational Grant Award must have been a member of the SCNA and a SCNA Member Club for at least 1 year prior to applying. The applicant must be between 13 and 17 years of age and have a minimum C average in school.

YNs will be judged on their contributions to their local coin club, SCNA, plus their accomplishments in school, church or community activities.

An applicant must have <u>at least 2</u> nominations. One nomination must be from his or her local coin club or from a SCNA member who personally knows them. The other nomination should be from a school professional, church or community leader who is involved with the nominee in one or more of these activities. Nominations should describe the applicant's contributions to the group. The applicant should also write a letter of self-nomination stating why he/she would like to attend an ANA Summer Seminar.

Previous SCNA scholarship/educational grant award recipients are not eligible. <u>At least 3 applications</u> must be received before the grant is awarded. If a Young Numismatist Educational Grant Award is granted, SCNA will match funds up to \$500.

The decision of the SCNA Young Numismatist Educational Grant Award Committee is final. Any questions about the nominating procedure should be directed to the SCNA Secretary.

The three (3) letters should be mailed separately to the SCNA Secretary and must be received by March 15, 2009. The winning applicant will be notified on or before June 1, 2009.

Since the club's inception, they have donated money and canned goods to the Anderson Interfaith Ministries. This organization provides food, services, and guidance to people that are going through tough times. This is something that the club does not have to do but something that the club, as a whole, wants to do.

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
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
