The Life and Collecting of Colonel Green

The following talk was given at the July 20, 2010, meeting of the Myrtle Beach Coin Club.

It's difficult to discuss Col. Green (born in 1868) without first learning something about his mother. Henrietta Howland Robinson, of New Bedford, Mass., was born in 1834. Her family members were Quakers who owned a large whaling fleet. At the age of two "Hetty" lived with her grandfather due to her mother's ill health. She took after her father and by the age of six she was reading financial papers. At thirteen she was the family bookkeeper and at 15 she went to school in Boston.

In 1864 she inherited her family's \$7.5 million in liquid assets. When she heard that her aunt Sylvia had willed two million dollars to charity she challenged the will in court, won and received the money. At the age of 33 she married Edward Henry Green and before the wedding she made him renounce all claims to her money and assets. Hetty had invested heavily in U.S. War Bonds and made \$1.25 million in those bonds in one year. She was very much a business woman and very stingy. She never turned on the heat or used hot water. She did not wash her hands and mostly ate pies that cost 15 cents each. She would not rent an office and used trunks and suitcases to hold all her papers. She earned the nickname "the Witch of Wall Street".

Her frugality extended to her family life. When her son Edward (Ned) Howard Robinson Green (later named "Colonel") broke his leg she tried to have him admitted to the local charity ward. When people there recognized her she stormed away vowing to treat the wound herself. The leg contracted gangrene and had to be amputated. He ended up with a cork prosthesis. When her children left home she moved repeatedly to small apartments, mainly to avoid having to pay a residence tax. In her old age she suffered a hernia and would not pay \$150 for the operation. She suffered many strokes and when she died at the age of 81 she

owned 7,800 pieces of real estate. The estimated worth was \$200 million, today's equivalent of \$3.8 billion, making her the richest woman in the world.

When his mother was alive, Ned moved away to manage the family's properties in Chicago and Texas. He became the director of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad and President of the Texas Midland Railroad. He was active in politics and in 1910 was appointed honorary colonel by Texas Governor Oscar Colquitt. He became an avid philatelist and assembled one of the finest stamp collections in private hands.

Ned Green was 47 when Hetty died and he immediately made life style changes that improved his comfort. He built the Round Hill Mansion, which was staffed with 100 employees to maintain the grounds and house. Same female staff members worked on his collections. He married his long-time housekeeper Mabel E. Harlow, who Hetty disapproved of. He had met her 24 years earlier when she was a practicing dancer and prostitute. During the time they were married he showered her with gifts, including a 24 cent Inverted Curtis Jenny Airmail C-3 stamp incased in a glass and gold locket. He gave her a \$50,000 diamond studded chastity belt. When they traveled they had private railroad cars, a valet, chauffeur, personal maids and stamp and coin secretaries. He collected stamps in a bold manner. He would purchase entire collections, including the J. K. Storrow collection, which he bought for \$77,500.00. Today it is worth in the tens of millions of dollars.

He would sit in his chauffeured limousine outside coin and stamp shops with his leg propped up and dealers would bring out collections which he bought with cash. He paid \$20,000 for the sheet of Curtis Jenny inverted airmail stamps. He also collected large, roomy automobiles like the Duesenberg. And he gave away hundreds of thousands of dollars to charities.

He collected railroad cars and amassed a large collection of pornography, and many diamonds, rubies and emeralds. At one time he bought a yacht for one million dollars and had it cut in half to add 40 feet to make its overall length 255 feet. One night while riding anchor it sank in calm waters of Buzzards Bay.

He would go to a stamp or coin show and buy everything. He owned some of the rarest coins and stamps in the world. At one time he owned all five 1913 Liberty Head nickels. He had a special case made and carried them with him to show them off. In his life time he also owned:

An 1804 Silver Dollar (one of 15 known)

An MS-66 1794 Flowing Hair dollar

5 of the top 10 1838-O Bust Reeded Edge half dollars (only 20 minted)-- #3, #5, #6, #7, #8

An MS-65 1804 Bust quarter (today worth \$310,000)

Numerous rare and early gold coins, including the 1906 Indian cent struck in gold

The finest known 1808 gold Eagle.

An AU-53 1798 Silver dollar

And more than 200 1796 Bust Quarters—circulated, BU and Gem BU.

Colonel Green's stamp collection was said to be second only to that of King George of England. He owned all 100 of the Inverted Jenny airmail stamps in a full sheet (today's worth would be \$17.6 million).

Upon his death on June 8, 1936 at Lake Placid, N.Y. it took a convoy of eight armored cars escorted by police and private guards to transport his collection. Four states battled over his estate, each claiming that Col. Green was a resident. The dispute went to the Supreme Court which decided in favor of Massachusetts. The state received \$5.25 million in taxes.

The Colonel left his entire estate to his sister. His stamp collection was dispersed in 28 auctions over four years, consisting of 50,000 lots. His wife Mabel filed a claim against the estate, despite the agreement that she had signed before their marriage. She kept the inverted Jenny stamp and the case was quietly settled. She died in 1950. The lawyers responsible for

handling Col. Green's estate were quoted as saying that the process was an incredible experience. Checking all those stamps and coins and counting the stacks of \$10,000 bills and bins of gems reminded one of a scene from "Arabian Nights".

It would be another story where the coins and stamps went and who acquired them.




SCANNER JOURNAL HISTORY: PART TWO

AN ILLUSTRATED HISTORY OF THE SCANNER JOURNAL COVERS

This segment augments the history that has been described in detail in Part One. In my opinion, there have been six distinct cover designs. However, some of the subsequent covers may appear to be somewhat different than those described below. This may be because of changes in the combination of design pieces, or because of different types of cover stock being used, or because of being printed in black and white, or because of the addition of color, or because of background stock used itself was of different colors.



FIRST ISSUE OF <u>SCanner</u>, **JULY**, **1973**. The cover was designed by George W. Crocker, the first President of SCNA. George made his living as a sign painter, sign builder, and commercial artist. George also created a brilliant exhibit of gold coins and other gold artifacts that won numerous Best of Show awards throughout the Southeast.

S. C. N. A. FIRST ANNUAL CONVENTION




SECOND COVER DESIGN. Not technically a regular SCanner issue, this cover was created especially for the first convention in **November**, **1973** as a convention guide. I chose to include it because of the organization history it evokes. The cover shows the Sheraton Motor Inn in Columbia, South Carolina which later became the Holiday Inn, City Center. This venue was the home of SCNA show numbers one, four, eleven, twelve, and thirteen.




THIRD COVER DESIGN. This cover was a forerunner to the design number four and was especially created for the third annual SCNA convention in **October**, **1975**. This was a last minute cover creation done by Archie Stein and the journal was edited by Bill McLees. No regular issue *SCanner* was published during the 1975 year.



FOURTH COVER DESIGN. This cover was designed by Archie Stein for the June, 1976 issue. The former Most Artistic Exhibit Award, as voted by the public as each show, was given as a memorial to him. Archie was well known for combining his artistic talents with his collections and presenting truly outstanding exhibits. Best known was his award-winning "Sketches of American Eagles."



FIFTH COVER DESIGN. This cover design is included her because it is unique. It was used just the one time in **October**, **1978** as a special convention issue. It featured a set of 1838 Aiken, South Carolina paper script. William H. McLees Jr. was both the SCNA President and General Chairman of this 6th Annual show and likely used notes from his South Carolina obsolete note collection to create this cover as the show was held in the Odell Weeks Recreation Center in Aiken.



SIXTH COVER DESIGN. This cover was created by the new editor in **February**, **1983**, Ann W. Shull. The cover is known as the "patch cover" because it featured the beautiful SCNA patch. The five-color patch was printed in all its glory on high quality paper for five years. This cover design is still in use today, but due to cost considerations, it is now printed in black and white on different colored cardboard stock.

Ann was the first editor to serve for more than two consecutive years, and raised the publication to new heights as a quality journal which was highlighted by this beautiful full color cover. In Part One of this history, I indicated that the February issue was late. The amount of work involved in creating this cover is what caused that delay.

WHO WAS EMMA F. TUCKER?

Knowing that I'm a collector of love tokens, a friend and fellow Myrtle Beach Coin Club member sold me an engraved 1884 Morgan dollar that he had had for years. (It was one of four love tokens that he had showed me. One was a gift and he told me to set the prices on the other three.) With most love tokens being engraved on Liberty Seated dimes, it's not common to see a Morgan dollar as the host coin.

This Morgan dollar love token was also a little unusual in that it was not smoothed on one or both sides, as was the practice, but engraved from coin edge to edge over the eagle on the reverse. The engraving was very difficult to read, not because of the lettering style, but because the coin was very dark. In addition, its grade was About Uncirculated, so the engraved letters and numbers blended with the lines of the eagle. The inscription, now easier to read because I dipped the coin, reads:

"Emma F Tucker Nov 4th 84"

I did some on-line research but have not been able to discover anything (for sure) about Ms. Tucker. With the "Nov 4th 84" and the coin being an 1884 I had to figure that the date was when she was born or died or, perhaps, both. I did find an Emma F. Tucker who was born on January 31, 1880, and died September 5, 1955. She is buried in the Whites Chapel Church of Christ Cemetery in Fayette County, Alabama. If the engraving was about her, what was the significance of the date? A baptism piece? Another special occasion? I don't know, but hope to learn.

New Quarter Series of 2010

I assume no one has found a Hot Springs National Park or any America the Beautiful quarters in circulation? I haven't gotten a letter or email from anyone. I got a Hot Springs quarter in change about 2 weeks ago after the release date but I haven't seen another one yet. The second and third quarters of the series, Yellowstone National Park and Yosemite National Park, have now been released. So keep looking for those quarters and let me know what you find.

Did you know what is on a Coin?

A coin has 3 sides. The main design on a coin is on the front called the obverse. On the reverse of a coin, there is another design and usually this is where one can find the value of the coin. The third side is called the edge. It can be smooth or ridged or reeded. The penny and nickel have smooth edges. Both sides of a coin have a rim. It is the raised part of the coin

that completely encircles both obverse and reverse. Here are some other parts to look for on coins:

Obverse:

- * Motto- "In God We Trust" on US coins
- * Date- when the coin was issued
- Design- on US coins is usually an image of a President
- * Field- blank space
- * Mint Mark- single letter indicating where the coin was made

Reverse:

- * Motto- currently "E Pluribus Unum" meaning "Out of Many One"
- * Image- historic or meaningful picture
- * Value- a coin's worth
- * Legend- name of country























